Tell our readers about your relationship to Blessed Trinity.

I started my teaching career at Assumption before the consolidation and was hired to be a first grade teacher in the consolidation. mean. Spend some time on these themes? Wasn't this just homework to be completed? Was the exercise to have been something more than a mere jotted idea within a rushed paragraph? I was perplexed. "Spend some time on these themes"-just what was my young mind missing about the importance of this assignment?

Thirty-four years later now, my vocation is that of a Crosier priest. As such, I'm to spend my life trying to discern and articulate deeper things, mysterious things, and complicated things-godly things. To be useful in preaching, I must be articulate in thought. To be articulate in thought, I must be invested in thinking and pondering. Thus, in all of my reading and writing and communication, I must be willing to "spend some time" on words and language and ideas and their presentation to the world.

In retrospect, I see that Mrs. Culnane opened my mind to the possibility of depth. She caught my attention by gently indicating that a growing mind cannot simply reside in the expedient or obvious. She taught me that thoughts and words matter, first regarding my own engagement with the world and its experiences, and still today with our shared engagement searching through mystery for the face of God.

Mrs. Culnane caught my attention towards what I had been missing in life's pursuits by her one simple phrase and ever after I seem to have spent a lot of time in its pondering. Thank You!
